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



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SECRETARY COMMENTS



The club spare parts list is now on the website. I have renamed the menu that used to be "Market" to "Parts", and the spare parts list can be found under there.

There was a very interesting article in the March / April Restorer. I don't know about the rest of you, but when using a feeler gauge, I've never been certain *exactly* how much drag I should be feeling at the correct gap. The article describes the construction of a jig to hold the distributor, and then using a dial gauge to measure the point opening as the distributor is rotated. The article author found that he consistently got a gap 3 thou smaller than he wanted.

My original thought was that building the distributor stand (by someone with better fabrication skills than me) would be a good educational project for the club - we could all have a go and test our gap measuring ability and set up our distributors. However, I then thought of the practicalities of removing my distributor with its armoured cable. So I'm now turning my attention to buying myself a new "toy" (dial gauge with mag base) and doing this test with the distributor in-situ and using the crank handle.

CMC DELEGATE'S REPORT

A general meeting of the CMC was held on the 19th April at Eden Hill, with about 45 delegates in attendance. Our own Dean Roberts was chairing the meeting in the absence of Geoff Moor – and a darn good job he did, under trying circumstances. A few people reckoned it was the best meeting they'd ever been to!! (Trying to get his swollen head back to normal size!!).

The usual Council housekeeping business was attended to, with an inconclusive update of the Classic Car Show - due to it only being held the day before. Crowd and car numbers, takings and all of that will be forthcoming. However, it was felt that there were more cars than last year and the programs ran out at 1.00pm, so that must mean that maybe more people also came through the gate – why wouldn't you, it was a glorious day! However, they are still looking for someone to run this major show next year, with assistance forthcoming from the CMC.

As has been the case over the past year or so, the main topic of conversation was the Concessions, both 404 and C4C.

Now that C4C has been rolled out, we are waiting to see what ramifications or anomalies it throws up. The C4C information is on the Dept of Transport website, along with FAQs and all the appropriate forms – look under "Concessions". There are already one or two areas of concern, of which the DoT will be advised.

The negotiating group from CMC gave us a report on where they see problems occurring for 404 Concession holders. There will be another meeting with the DoT before the June CMC meeting – and some interesting points were raised which will be taken to that meeting. These include where our responsibilities as a Club are concerned.

The CMC Secretary's role is still officially vacant – any takers?? They are also looking for an IT person to help out with the roll-out of the Wild Apricot computer system.

On the federal scene, negotiations have recommenced with the federal government, (after stalling a bit during the pandemic), regarding the luxury tax on imported vehicles over 70 years old – we await what might come of this.

Next CMC General meeting will be held on 21st June.

It is a recent restoration that is still being run in, vehicle has new A Model engine including:

- 1. Dynamic-balanced crank , flywheel and pressure plate.
- 2. New clutch plate.
- 3. Machined / lightened flywheel. New ring gear installed.
- 4. Re-ground crank, big ends & mains.
- 5. Rods re-metaled.
- 6. New gudgeon bushes.
- 7. New pistons (0.080").
- 8. Re-bore and hone cylinders.

9. New rings.

10. New B water pump and nylon fan.

11. Model B high compression head, tested, planed and sealed.

- 12. Re-ground Camshaft 0.330" lift.
- 13. Aluminium timing gear.

14. Modern adjustable valve lifters and guides.

15. O/size Modern 1 3/4" intake valves and std size exhaust valves.

16. PCV valve installed.

TECHNICAL TIP


Keeping Lubricant in a Model A Steering Box

Like many Model A's, our phaeton suffered from lubricant leaking from the steering box even though the bushes are in good condition. Whilst the amount of lubricant over a period of weeks only amounted to a few drops - it was annoying.

A fellow club member, (John Forbes) advised that he had solved the problem with new bushes and a spring loaded felt washer positioned adjacent to the frame. I tried the felt washer with limited success.

Whilst lying on my back studying this problem, it was noted that approx. 1/8" of round shaft protruded from the steering box through the frame before the square section. I removed the two securing bolts holding the steering box to the frame and applied gasket sealant between the steering box and frame. A standard two lip oil seal was placed over the shaft and against the outer side of the frame. Again, some gasket cement was placed between the outer part of the seal and frame. A spring and thrust washer was positioned between the seal and pitman arm (see sketch).

After some months and several hours the steering box remains free of leaks!! Whilst this technique is not as sound as removing the steering box and machining the box to take a special seal, for just a few dollars my problem was solved!!



NOTE 1. The above examiners and authorised premises are appointed by the Department of Transport to examine vehicles for licensing purposes for Class B Concession Type Code 404.

NOTE 2. Vehicles being licensed for concession Code 404 Class B can also be examined at a DoT examination centre or at an Authorised Vehicle Examination Centre. Motor vehicles from Jan. 1970 and motor cycles from July 1975 not previously licensed in Australia can only be inspected at a DoT Authorised Examination Centre.

NOTE 3. The above AIS /AVE are approved for the examination of light vehicles only, i.e. less than 4500kg GVM. AIS marked with an * (Asterix) examine motor cycles only. WA Omnibus Group AIS 167 U is for the examination of cars and heavier vehicles.

NOTE 4. It is essential that individual AIS/AVE personnel are contacted prior to an examination to arrange an appointment.
