MAHONY'S GOULBURN TRIP

One of the things I have learnt over the years about taking long journeys is that you have to leave no stone unturned in your preparation. My preparation for the trip to Goulburn was no exception. A couple of weeks before leaving, I got the car trailer out, greased all the wheel bearings, repaired one brake cylinder that had seized since last used, checked all the lights, checked and pumped up all tyres including two spares. Toni got a hand held radio out in the back yard and we checked that the two-way in the bus was working. I checked water and oil etc.

Now that everything is ready to go, come join our journey.

We got under-way at about 10.30 on Saturday 27th August and stopped in Meckering for lunch. The first thing I noticed was the RHF tyre on the trainer was shredded. GOOD START. Having changed the wheel, with the help a nice man whose wife said to Toni "he thought he would give 'the old fella' a hand" we continued on.


Just out of Coolgardie, we had to slow for "Old man emu" and his 9 chicks who decided to wander out in front of us. Fortunately we saw them in plenty of time.

When we stopped east of Norseman on the second night, I noticed that although all the lights worked on the bus, we had none on the trailer. Ok, who needs lights in the middle of nowhere anyway?

The next night we stopped on the Nullabor cliffs. The view and sunset was fantastic, as usual.

When I got out off the bus at Toni's sister's (Sandy) place in Streaky Bay, I noticed the RHF tyre on the trailer was half flat. Brother-in-law Ken gave me one of his extra spare wheels to fit, we then examined the cause of the flat; 12 small pieces of very fine wire were removed. Fortunately only one had penetrated.

Having repaired the puncture we proceeded to check the lights. We found that the earth wire to the connector had come loose, however when that was fixed we still had no lights. Further examination found four breaks in the wiring to the lights (old cable) so we

rewired the trailer. Then we found the hazard light fuse had blown, so that was replaced. Now we have indicators and stop lights, but no tail/park light. That is - none on the trailer or the bus. After checking the fuses and relays we decide "who needs tail lights if you are not driving at night?"

Oh yes, we had not heard anything on the radio since leaving home, so we checked that out. The cable from the hand piece to the radio had a faulty wire connection. If you gave the cable a wriggle, it would work - sometimes. A kind friend of Ken's gave me another radio.

We detoured through Adelaide to see some of my cousins, before catching up with another of Toni's sisters who were camped by the river in Narrandera.

While in Streaky Bay, we visited an 85yo friend (John) of Ken and Sandy's who lived on a farm about 30 km out of town. While there, we looked at the old shearing shed that had been used from 1865 up until 1986. Trapped under the floor inside the shed, was one of John's rams; one of the expensive ones. John said it had been missing for about two weeks. TASK – RESCUE THE RAM.

John also has a beautiful little chapel which was a converted school room. There was also a small room

on the side where visiting priests from all over the world stayed when they visited to say a Latin mass. John is an old 'die in the woods' Latin Catholic who will have nothing to do with these 'English masses'. His grave has been dug at the end of the chapel.

The rest of the trip to Goulburn was uneventful, although the roads were atrocious. Especially the Sturt Highway which was badly damaged from all the rain they had been having.

We set up camp at the Goulburn Sports Ground and Andrae and Gary joined us the next day.


After unloading the car and setting up, I noticed that the trailer was broken. The rough roads had been too much for it and the stays along the top had broken away from the front upright. Fortunately there was a metal fabrication place across the road, so I had it repaired during the week.


The weather in Goulburn was less than desirable; -1 to 2 degrees over night. It rained/drizzled a little and blew a lot. The breeze was cold and persistent.

Other than that, it was a good rally; interesting runs and lots of catching up with people. They had some very interesting display items which, unfortunately I can't show because I lost my photos. They included a fully operational replica of Henry's Quadracycle, a cut away Model A engine, and several laser printed Model A parts, including a ¼ scale engine.

The Fashion Show of original clothing from the 1920-30's was quite wonderful according to Toni (she went to that while I attended a tech talk).

The mandatory run, the scenic run, was marred by even worse roads than the Sturt Highway, so I could not admire the scenery! The morning tea provided by the ladies of Bungedore was to die for.

2022 GYMKHANA

On Sunday October 9^{9h}, the second annual Gymkhana was held in Stoneville. Although the weather was amazing, there was a drop in competitor numbers from 2021. Seven teams competed this year in front of a number of spectators. Some competitors are quite serious and compete hard, while others are more careful with their car and more careful in their enthusiasm.

The competition this year included some exciting games including:

Clothes Line – The passenger had to place washing on a line from inside their vehicle. The loss of pegs or clothing, and not hanging the clothing sufficiently meant penalty points for each. Each second taken also gained a penalty point. (Won by Cara Jeffree and friend Taz)

Weaving – Having to weave your vehicle through cones up and back in the fastest time practicable. Each second resulted in a penalty point. (Won by Ray & Penny Major)

Garage Parking – Drivers, without the help of their passengers, had to park into a 'garage' and be within a 20cm distance of the back of the garage. Three 'garages' needed to be used, reverse and forward parking. Time was again a penalty factor. (Won by Ray & Penny Major)

Blind Driving – The driver is blind folded, and the passenger had to direct them through a course, without touching the driver, steering wheel, or handbrake at all. This created some colourful and loud directions as well as hand gestures that couldn't be seen by the drivers. Penalties were incurred for time, as well as hitting any cones on the course.
